Thank you very much for your note and for notifying me about your change in plans and address. I'm not sure whether I'm addressing this letter correctly, or that it will ever**parameter** reach you.

In case it does, however, I'd like to make two points:

- If you get a chance--and I know how you hate letter writing--I'd appreciate it very much if you could tell me briefly, say, two paragraphs or so, about the general results of your preliminary work on 50mc and 100mc. Also, what do you intend to do in Australia?
- 2. I look forward to another evening with you if you ever return to the United States which I assume you will do some day !

I learned a good deal during m y trip abroad. I spent a week or ten days at the University of Leiden with Oort and van de Hulst, at the Jodrell Bank Station with Hanbury Brown mainly, at Cambridge with Ryle and his group, and I spent some time also with J.S.Hey who is now with the Radar Research Establishment.

At present I am broke and hanging in mid-air. I've applied for a renewal of my Guggenheim grant. If I get it, I shall start writing up the material I have promptly. If I don't, I shall have to earn money in other ways and that will take me away from the book for at least six monthe--something I don't want to happen. We shall see. I should know in two or three weeks.
