Dear Dr. Hurlburt,

In accordance with your letter of 10th February, I have written to the people in question and several others. Replies of various sorts have arrived in due time. None have any particular relevance to my ideas, which I will elaborate at a later date.

The purpose of this letter is to enquire whether or not N.S.F. has received any proposals to conduct radio astronomy experiments at a wavelength of thirty meters or longer in the Great Lakes area? If so, please supply me with the name and address of the proposer. If not, please make a few phone calls to appropriate people at N.A.S.A., Air Force, O.N.R. and other government granting agencies to learn if they have received any proposals on this subject.

Your letter mentions a study being made of an array. Please have my name added to list of people receiving any literature developed by this group. I think I am still on the list chaired by M.M. Small studying a large dish.

Enclosed are three recent reprints of mine. I particularly commend the one from SCIENCE to your examination.
